You May Be Eligible for Additional Rental Assistance from FEMA

COLUMBUS, Ohio—If you are a homeowner or renter who initially received rental assistance from FEMA as a result of the severe storms, tornadoes and flooding on May 27-29, 2019, and home repairs are taking longer than expected, you may be eligible for additional rental assistance.

You must document your need for additional rental assistance by providing FEMA with a completed Declaration of Continuing Need for Rental Assistance form as well as other required paperwork to show you used your initial funds from FEMA to pay for new housing.

If you did not receive a declaration form in the mail, contact the FEMA Helpline to request one be mailed to you or request one in person at your nearest [Disaster Recovery Center](#). For more information or to get answers to your questions about the FEMA process, call 800-621-3362 (including 711 or Video Relay). TTY users can call 800-462-7585. The toll-free numbers are open from 7 a.m. to 9 p.m. EDT every day. Multilingual operators are available.

Return the Declaration form with the paperwork to FEMA's Individuals and Households Program by:

- Uploading them to your online account at [DisasterAssistance.gov](#) (or creating a new account at the website and uploading them to it).
